The event, in its eighth year, raised just over \$46,000.00 through a variety of supportive options.

Pip Courtney ('Landline' ABC Television commentator and 2011 inductee into the Rural Press Club's Rural Journalism Hall of Fame) opened the formal part of the proceedings by introducing the Governor who spoke of "the immense spirit of compassion and togetherness" – so important to the core of the event's ethos.

The Governor's address was followed by a presentation from 'Outback Futures'.



This year the Committee chose to re-visit 'Outback Futures' in order for initiatives, commenced in 2022, to be extended. Selena Gomersall again spoke on behalf of this not-for-profit charity.

In Selena's own words:

When I first started working in the outback, a grazier's wife said to me she felt like they should be called the 'invisible people'. "Have you ever driven through remote Qld?" she asked? ".... You can drive for hours, and see only letterboxes and gateways. You rarely see people as you drive those lonstraight roads. We rarely feel truly seen" Outback Futures has been very much about walking with remote communities to ensure they feel truly seen and valued when it comes to their unique mental health and wellbeing challenges.

This RNA High Tea has previously supported an Outback Futures initiative to understand and shift the wellbeing needs

and outcomes for our remote children through the use of a remarkable digital tool called Rumbles Quest, to begin developing outback specific, wellbeing prevalence data for kids – ground breaking work! and today's event is resourcing us to take the next step, by beginning to deliver to remote families, through the Mt Isa School of the Air, an initiative called "Resilient Kids' . This initiative supports our rural and remote children to understand the concept of resilience and build a resilience tool kit. – Most importantly - it is an initiative that has been specifically and carefully designed with and for the bush!

So often, programs, initiatives, and services are designed for a city context and are then simply prescribed onto a bush culture. ... and it doesn't work! – In fact it ensures our bush Aussies continue to feel invisible, SO, whilst this "Resilient Kids" work utilizes concepts and tools that are evidence based across the globe – Outback Futures has translated them to speak to our bush kids directly, - like our little friend Charlie, who I'd like to introduce you to:

The Resilient Kids project will help hundreds of bush kids like Charlie to understand who is there for them, particularly when things are

tough . . .

Someone once said that. "If someone really wants to see you, they will find a reason, they will find a way, and they will make the effort". We know the reason, and today you are part of 'finding a way' and 'making an effort'. Together, with this bush specific, "Kids resilience" initiative, we are working to shift the landscape such that our next generation in the bush, no longer feel invisible, but feel truly seen and valued, and are equipped with the tools to better manage their wellbeing to become resilient Australians.

The 'High Tea' event also welcomed Lyn French and Tracey Alder from 'BushED' – the 2023 charity recipients. These two ladies set up an information booth, where questions could be asked and information passed on. Everyone always greatly appreciates being brought up-to-date with what has happened with the previous year's funds.

While the main aim of the 'High Tea' is to raise funds to support rural and isolated families, 'Fun and Friendship with Friends and Family' is also a major drawcard for all who attend. Ladies travel from near and far, making early August a regular time for catching up with some who they haven't seen for a year.
